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
























































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#### "Meet the Club": Peak Field Archers.

I got to learn all about the club from the lovely Dave Holland here's what he had to share...

Hello, I'm Dave Holland I'm 63 and a care worker. I've done archery since shooting as a child on the farm I lived on (but shooting rabbits mostly, I didn't know it was illegal then). Then there was a massive gap and then - during COVID - I was working a solid week at a time, then having days off, so I started archery again on the farm I was living at the time - this was to give me something to do and keep my brain going.

I'm now based near Buxton, Derbyshire where the club is based. We are located in an old quarry, which hasn't been mined since the late 70s. The site is now covered in trees and shrubbery and has two large lakes - one containing crested newts, but neither have any fish.

I had been shooting EFAA and WA field and 3D events and I become interested in the courses in Austria and Germany and wanted to build a course that had more rugged terrain. I spent 2 years tracking down

different places and found another local quarry, but after some time this fell through, but I'm still working on getting that one.

So, after a lot of digging in local council planning applications I found the owner of our present site. I visited the owner and he said, "Yes, that fine". I went away slightly shocked. At this point I had no money for anything, but I had the land sorted.

I then started asking clubs for any old bosses I could use and buying the occasional one. I then had some luck - when buying a couple of bosses online and chatting to someone, he offered me around 10 bosses plus strimmers, club bows and tools et cetera. This was a great deal as unluckily for him, his club had lost its grounds, I also got another 14 bosses from a club in Reyleigh in Essex.

So at that point I started laying out the course - this was hard one as I had to carry out bosses on my back, the furthest target being half a mile away, a hundred feet up.

I then had some luck with a chap asking to help me out... Nigel Braddock then joined me setting up and bashing in posts, until the course had 28 targets in place.









I managed to get a £500 fund from the EFAA to help start up the club, which paid for a box trailer to use as our canteen. At this point the club consisted of 4 people, which was enough to register as a club.

We then started having classification shoots and we have slowly started building our club membership.

This is our first year of having a working club and so far we have held the Cheshire WA 2 day Championship and the EFAA Nationals, plus a classification shoot once a month. So far the clubs rent is paid for by myself as the club doesn't earn enough and any money we do earn goes towards building the club up. Holding a 2-day WA and the EFAA Nationals has put much-needed finances into the club which will be put towards purchasing 3D targets. The quarry has enough room to put in a 3D course alongside the target course.

The EFAA course is set up with 28 targets for adults, juniors and cubs; as are the 24 AGB pegs. We can only hold an event once every 4 weeks, but we do have maintenance days - which we do nearly every Sunday - on which club members can shoot round.

The ethos of the club is to try and bring archers from target into field and to support archers shooting in world and European competitions to gain more experience with angles, cuts and harder conditions.

We were lucky to have been be asked to hold the nationals this year and the date was changed so that it didn't clash with the NFAS Championships.

We have worked hard to prepare our club for hosting shoots and prior to the EFAA Nationals - having already held the Cheshire Champs, with 50 archers in attendance - we had an idea of what food, drink and parking we would need to provide.







We were lucky that the EFAA got us a sponsor for all of the target faces for the 2 days of shooting - this sponsorship was from Chiltern Archery, who also supplied banners and signs.





Our plans are to get a 3D course running next year and we will be holding some unmarked 2D EFAA classification shoots before we hold another WA unmarked/marked 2-day event in June.

We will then be heading out to Hungary after that for a road trip to shoot in Germany and Austria and then on to the European Bowhunter Champs.

It sounds - when reading this back to myself - that it appears that I've got money to burn! BUT I'm just a care worker on minimum wage who is willing to put the hours in to get what I want.

If you want to come for a visit and/or join our club, we shoot under EFAA rules, so in order to join us you would need to first join the EFAA for which I can sign you off after seeing you shoot.





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
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# Unsighted and Clash of the Classics Shoot III Report




Behind the scenes, Admin ran smoother than a wellwaxed bowstring, swiftly handling peg changes and

few bacon slices along the way 🐾 😂 ).






The course was no pushover, but plenty of 24s were scored, much to the Riddler's dismay.



Marshals roamed the course, offering help,


encouragement and the occasional chuckle. Even the elusive lost arrows were found and returned to the owners.



# The Bowyer's Diary "Flights of Fancy"

# by Derek Hutchison AKA 'Del the Cat'.

My interest in Flight Shooting has been reinvigorated by reading "Harry Drake and Flight Archery" by Kay Koppedrayer. It made me realise that to really progress I needed to make a shoot through bow (true centre shot), using a "flipper" release aid, with an overdraw (an arrow rest extending towards the archer) allowing me to shoot shorter arrows which would be lighter and more aerodynamic.

Bear in mind I'm only working with wooden bows and arrows, an "off the peg" f/glass or carbon recurve could easily out-distance a wooden bow.

I already had an old reflex/deflex bamboo backed yew bow of about 35-40# which would be a good starting point for a prototype/proof of concept model. I sawed the bow in half and glued additional wood to bulk up the ends where they would slot into the riser, which I built out of scrap plywood, with a forward mounted grip to allow a comfortable draw hand position when shooting a 20" arrow.

The prototype riser worked fairly well but creaked alarmingly, it was also rather wide and bulky forcing my left (bow) arm out at the elbow.

I took it to the club where we have enough clear distance for flight and had a few shots. The string flew off with every shot, but my tiny arrows survived both launch and landing.

It shot 301 yards which was a bit disappointing until I accurately measured the draw weight. It was only 32#, so that yardage is very respectable. It had felt heavier due to the awkward grip and early draw weight.




Pictured: Mk1 flight bow.





It certainly proved the concept, so I ordered some decent birch ply in a couple of thicknesses and a load of nice flange head screws. I also sawed 4.5" off each limb tip and designed the Mk2 with less deflex in the limb mounting to increase the draw weight.

The Mk2 riser was built narrower at the sockets where the limbs slot in (the limb sockets allow the limbs to be shimmed out to adjust their angle if required) and wider at the centre for the shoot through aperture. The ply is all glued up from one side with the other side face screwed on so that adjustments and modifications can be made. This proved to be much more solid than the Mk1.

I'd made a variety of flight arrows ranging from 141 to 319 grain and 5.5 to 6.8mm diameter all fletched with very thin brown card painted with low viscosity superglue. They were sprayed fluorescent yellow to help with finding them.

The first shot was with the heaviest arrow (to minimise the risk to bow or arrow). It loosed with some noise but no drama. As I loosed the next arrow I saw something white fly forward and left and there was a bit of a clatter.

I found a piece of plywood had come away and it took a while to work out what had happened! The upper limb had been forced down in the socket by about half an inch (probably as the string slammed home) and had pushed out the ply which formed the bottom of the socket (see pic below - *Mk2 failure*). The bow couldn't be shot again without doing some repairs.



I walked down range with one of my chums, who said that the second arrow had come out low, but I think he was confusing it with the ply that flew out (you can't see the arrow go at these speeds).

We found the first arrow at 325 yards and walked on in hope... there was the second, stuck firmly into the ground at a nice 45 degree angle...

365yards, a new PB!

I'm striving to break 400yards and hopefully once I've done the repairs, I'll get close!

Or book an hour's help with your shooting. £55 or £85 for two souls.



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

### "Sassanid Archery & the Sassanid Bow"

The Sassanids were the last and longest-lived dynasty of Persia before the Muslim conquest of the seventh century A.D. They employed many of the cavalry tactics of the Achaemenids and Parthians (https:// archeryhistorian.com/parthian-shot/) who came before them. Relying on powerful composite bows, Sassanid archery involved shooting on foot, as on horseback. Being neighbours with <u>Turkic</u> (<u>https://</u> <u>archeryhistorian.com/turkish-bow/</u>) peoples in the north, as well as the <u>Huns</u> (https://archeryhistorian.com/hun-bow/), and inheriting the domains of the Parthians, the Sassanids were well acquainted with the martial tactics of the mounted archers. Beautiful depictions of Sassanian warriors, mounted and in full combat apparel, discharging their bows are well preserved on metal plates. This article explores Sassanid archery and the Sassanid bow.



#### Sassanid Empire

Before delving too deeply into the nuance of Sassanid archery, let us briefly explore the Sassanids themselves and their empire of late antiquity.

The Empire was founded by a local Iranian ruler named <u>Ardashir I</u> (<u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Ardashir I</u>) who gradually rose to prominence as the Parthians grew weak from wars with their great rival Rome, as well as from internal struggles for power.

The dynasty was officially established after a decisive defeat of <u>Artabanus IV</u> (<u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Artabanus IV of Parthia</u>), the last Parthian monarch, at the <u>Battle of Hormozdgan</u> (<u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Battle\_of\_Hormozdgan</u>) in 224.

Ardashir I set out to restore the ancient empire of the Achaemenid Empire (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Achaemenid Empire) by expanding Iran's influence. The Parthians were seen by some local powers as usurpers and outsiders who had taken power by force and not by legitimate hereditary means. The Sasanian Empire at its height encompassed all of present-day Iraq and Iran and stretched from the Eastern Mediterranean (Egypt, modern-day Turkey) to Pakistan and parts of southern Central Asia.

The Sasanians oversaw a golden age during the 400 years of its reign. They tolerated the multitude of various cultures and faiths of their subjects, yet were able to rejuvenate Zoroastrianism as a unifying force. Through strong centralized government, they oversaw the building of great monuments and public works.

It was the Sasanians who transferred Persian culture to the coming Islamic culture, exerting great influence with regards to architecture, art, literature and philosophy.


#### Sassanid Cavalry

The armies of the Sassanids included a mixed and varied force of infantry and cavalry recruited from local sources as well as mercenaries. However, the most prestigious and notorious component of the Sassanid armies was the cavalry.

The army units and organization of the previous Parthians were retained and consisted of light cavalry, primarily horse archers and the heavy cavalry - the infamous Cataphracts.

Light cavalry units were recruited from nomadic tribes to the north, notably Turkic tribes such as the Hephalites and Khazars. The Cataphracts were made of noblemen who underwent extensive military training.

Another aspect of the Sassanian cavalry that is worth mentioning is the use of war elephants. Unlike the Parthians who came before, the Sassanids recruited and trained an elephant corps from the Indus Valley civilization. The war elephants apparently made an excellent platform from which to discharge arrows. Their presence on any battlefield would also be quite intimidating from a psychological warfare point of view.

#### Sassanid Cataphract

The word Cataphract is a derivative of the Greek κατάφρακτος kataphraktos (plural: κατάφρακτοι Kataphraktoi), meaning "totally enclosed" or "completely armoured"; the prefix kata-/cata- implying "intense" or "completely").

The fighting equipment of the heavily-armed Sasanian horsemen was:

- helmet, hauberk (Pahlavi griwban)
  - breastplate
    - mail coat
  - gauntlet (Pahlavi abdast)

- girdle
- thigh-guards (Pahlavi ran-ban)
  - Sword
  - mace
- archery equipment: bow case with two bows and two bowstrings,
   quiver with 30 arrows and two extra bowstrings
  - horse armour (zen-abzar).

Greek historian, Ammianus Marcellinus's description of Shapur II's cavalry sheds some light on how heavily equipped it was:

"All the companies were clad in iron and all parts of their bodies were covered with thick plates, so fitted that the stiff-joints conformed with those of their limbs; and the forms of human faces were so skilfully fitted to their heads, that since their entire body was covered with metal, arrows that fell upon them could lodge only where they could see a little through



tiny openings opposite the pupil of the eye, or where through the tip of their nose they were able to get a little breath. Of these, some who were armed with pikes, stood so motionless that you would have thought them held fast by clamps of bronze."

#### Sassanid Archery & The Thumb Release

Being the inheritors of the previous Parthian domains, as well as neighbours to various mounted nomads, the Sassanians would have been all too familiar with the techniques of archery used during their time.

Powerful composite recurve bows, expertly crafted from wood, horn and sinew, would have been their go-to weapons. Sassanid archery was a prized skill during the dominion of the last pre-Islamic empire of the Middle East.

One of the more intriguing aspects of Sassanid archery is the uniqueness of their draw (https://archeryhistorian.com/how-to-draw-a-bow-and-arrow-traditional-to-modern/). Being heavily influenced by the Parthians as well as various nomadic tribes to the north and east, the Sassanids would have encountered archers who loosed their bows with a thumb draw, also sometimes referred to as an eastern or Mongolian (https://archeryhistorian.com/mongol-bow/) draw.



To perform the typical thumb draw the thumb hooks the string and the index finger is secured over the thumbnail for additional support.

The Sassanids however, as can be discerned from artwork, most notably on metal plates, are shown to have an entirely unique draw. It is not known for certain, yet it appears that the thumb may have been used to engage the string, with the middle and ring fingers resting on top of the thumbnail. The index finger is free and often depicted as outstretched, possibly along the arrow shaft. The pinky finger is also unengaged. It looks like the archers are giving the "devil's horns" gesture as is or has been quite popular to do in the rock and roll era.

Having the index finger outstretched and placed along the shaft of the arrow would help secure the arrow in place along the side of the bow. Another practical reason for outstretching the index and pinky finger is that it would anatomically encourage the other fingers to open faster.

It could also be argued, that the Sassanians were, in fact, using a finger draw, more similar to the Mediterranean draw than the thumb draw. Instead of the thumb engaging the string, the middle and ring fingers would draw the string, with the thumb resting over the drawing fingers to form a lock ...



#### Hand Position and Release Method


One interesting feature of some of the depictions of archers at full draw on metal plates seems to be the angle of the draw hand. The depictions vary, and as previously mentioned, this may be due to artistic oversight, yet some of the draw hands of the Sassanian archers seem to be either vertical, while others are clearly depicted as having hands turned towards the horizontal.

In order for the thumb, or thumb ring to be in full contact with the string, the hand is in a horizontal position, with the palm of the hand parallel to and facing the ground. When the hand is turned towards a more vertical position, the thumb and/or thumb ring will not fully engage the string.

This method of drawing the bow with the thumb is still practically possible and allows for a faster disengagement from the string due to the decrease in contact and friction with the string as opposed to a fully horizontal hand position.




#### Sassanid Archery & The Shooting Glove

The Sassanids are sometimes depicted as wearing a particular device on their drawing hand. It is visible on the back of the hand as two cross straps, possible leather. What is going on on the other side of the "glove" is not clear. Knowing this would of course help us in determining what style of draw they were using; finger draw or thumb draw. Modern reconstructions of this Sassanid archery shooting glove have been reproduced to aid in drawing the bow in both finger and thumb style draws.

#### Sassanid Archery Depicted on Plates

The Sassanians were an artistic group of people. During the 400 year reign of this dynasty, Persian art, architecture and culture in general went through a golden age. They would go on to influence much of the Islamic world, especially in art and architecture.

One of the most fascinating archaeological finds from the Sassanian era (224-651 A.D.) is the several metal plates found throughout their old

domains. They vary in size, but most are approximately 25 to 30 centimetres in diameter. Being exquisitely crafted, they are typically made from silver. The usual theme depicted on these plates is the Sassanid king on the hunt.



Although ancient artwork was idealized to a certain extent, the depictions are highly detailed and skilfully crafted. The depictions on these plates give us some interesting insights into Sassanid archery.

Firstly the artwork depicts the shape of the composite bow the Sassanids used during this time. It appears with exceptionally long siyahs (the straight, non-bending tips of the bow). The artwork shows the archer at full draw, with the bow under maximum strain. The bow

The archers, being depicted at full draw, also illustrates the unique draw of the Sassanids as discussed above. The draw seems to be quite a healthy length, with most archers drawing to the ear and some well past the head.

exhibits the classic curves of composite recurve bows used throughout

the steppe.



Even though these plates had a distinct style which can easily be recognized as Sassanian, a wide variety of shooting configurations and hunts are shown. Some of the archers shoot forward in the saddle, while others perform the infamous Parthian shot, shooting backward at full gallop. Some plates even show the mounted archer sitting backward on the horse, shooting to the rear.

Although horses seem to have been the preferred mode of transport for royalty, archers and cavalrymen are also depicted riding camels and elephants.

#### The Sassanids and the Huns

The Sassanian Empire and their arch-rival the Byzantines (East Romans) did indeed have many things in common. One of these commonalities was their nomadic enemies on their borders. Both the Byzantines and the Sassanians were nearly constantly engaging with the nomadic hordes to their north and east.

While the Byzantines would have their hands full with the <u>Hunnic tribes</u> (<a href="https://archeryhistorian.com/hun-bow/">https://archeryhistorian.com/hun-bow/</a>) who would migrate westwards into Europe and reach their height of power under their infamous King Attila, the Sassanians had to deal with other Hunnic tribes who were raiding and pillaging their northern frontiers.


In the early 400s, tribes known as the "White Huns" or Hephalites attacked and raided northern Iran. They were expelled and reappeared several times throughout the Sassanid empire. Alliances were sometimes made with these nomads in order to attack the Byzantines.

Some other tribes of Huns that bordered and interacted with the Sassanids include the <u>Alchon Huns</u> and the <u>Nezak</u>.


